**Method(s) of delivery**

The RN-BSN is delivered 100% within two 8-week terms per semester. Admissions are both fall and spring.

### Changes since last review

The DON has produced more graduates and has implemented several changes to support the growth of the number of graduates. The DON implemented new end-of-program student learning outcomes based on the six Quality and Safety Education for Nurses (QSEN) competencies in Fall 2018. The BSN EPSLOS are as follows:

#### BSNEPSLOs

1. Synthesizes nursing that is patient-centered, caring, culturally sensitive and based on the physiological, psychosocial and spiritual needs of patients.
2. Collaborate with members of the inter-professional health care team to promote continuity of patient care and achievement of optimal outcomes.
3. Interprets best current evidence, expert opinion, and clinical expertise as a basis for nursing practice and clinical judgment.
4. Evaluates the development and implementation of quality improvement strategies to advance health care services.
5. Provide a safe environment for patients, self, and others.

These end-of-program student learning outcomes are assessed with a variety of assessments during the last two semesters of the program and are evaluated each summer during the institution's assessment cycle.

The DON entered into a consortium agreement with twelve USG institutions to collaborate with the RN-BSN program. The agreement required a change in curriculum as course offerings would now be offered with the other USG partners. The DON continues to admit students to the RN-BSN program. However, enrolled students will take classes with fellow colleagues across the state through e-major with 15 credits hours completed with MGA. Under this new structure, Dr. Josephine Kamera, assumed the lead role for the program and serves point of contact.

#### Benchmarks of progress

The DON evaluates program outcomes for the BSN program with PLNCLEX pass rates (*Does not apply to RN-BSN option*), program completion, and job placement rates. The current expected levels of achievement are as follows:

**Plans for action**

Based on the program data, the DON has focused on enrollment. The DON has realized enrollment growth and growth in the number of graduates. Recruitment consists of classroom visits with ASN students in their 3<sup>rd</sup> semester. Plans include exploring recruitment opportunities with Central Georgia Technical College. Over 75% of our RN-BSN graduates experience a role change or consider applying to graduate school within 12 months of graduation. Enrollment is increasing with the current enrollment at 39 students for spring 23.

**Shifting trends and market forces that may impact program demand**

The economy impacts the enrollment as nurses completing the RN-BSN option pay out of pocket unless employers contribute to education expenses. The employer requirements for nurses to have a bachelor's degree also impacts enrollment. Several USG schools have deactivated the RN-BSN program option due to low enrollment numbers. The consortium provides an opportunity for the option to remain viable for those seeking this credential at MGA.

## IEB's Comprehensive Program Review Rubric and Evaluation

**Program Strengths of Note:** There are many! Just to name a few:

- Enrollment has increased by 30.77% from fall 2018 to fall 2022, and its number of graduates has increased 54.55% over the same period. Please note, we believe that Chair Ingram has a typo for her fall 2018 compared to fall 2022 only enrollment percent increase. She has 20.51%, while it is really 30.77%.
- The Department of Nursing (DON) has produced more graduates and has implemented several changes to support the growth of the number of graduates. The DON implemented new end-of-program student learning outcomes based on the six Quality and Safety Education for Nurses (QSEN) competencies in fall 2018.
- Chair Ingram has successfully focused on enrollment of the program. Recruitment consists of classroom visits with ASN students in their 3rd semester. Plans include exploring recruitment opportunities with Central Georgia Technical College. Over 75% of their RN-BSN graduates experience a role change or consider applying to graduate school within 12 months of graduation. Enrollment is increasing with the current enrollment at 39 students for spring 23.
- Licensure examination pass rates met their expected levels of achievement for the past three years, with a statistically significant increase between 2021 and 2022.

**Areas of Concern:** This is a minor critique. Although getting a 24% response rate of your 2021 graduates is a perfectly fine sample size, our subcommittee feels that more effort should be made to increase this percentage substantially, given that you are just seeking evidence of professional nurse employment within 12 months of graduating from our program.

**Other Comments:** Several USG schools have deactivated the RN-BSN program option due to low enrollment numbers. Therefore, MGA provides an opportunity for the option to remain viable for those seeking this credential.

The RN to BSN program continues to be a very productive program. As of Fall 2022, Middle Georgia State University's RN to BSN program became a part of the eCampus collaborative initiated by the University System of Georgia (USG). This joint venture of 13 RN to BSN programs through an e-major initiative began in June 2021.

These students are already working as registered nurses and have passed the NCLEX; therefore, licensure pass rates are not applicable to this population of students.

As of Spring 2023, MGA had the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest enrollment of RN to BSN students in the collaborative. We will continue to market this program and promote our articulation agreement with the technical colleges.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing RN to BSN program at Middle Georgia State University (MGA) has successfully met enrollment and retention expectations, demonstrating resilience in the face of market challenges. In Fall 2022, MGA's RN to BSN program became an integral part of the eCampus collaborative initiated by the University System of Georgia (USG), joining forces with 13 other RN to BSN programs through an e-major initiative that commenced in June 2021. Notably, MGA attained the 3rd largest enrollment among participating institutions as of Spring 2023, a testament to the program's appeal and strategic marketing efforts.
